In this presentation, Molly Davis explained the role the JCMH plays in bringing SIM Mapping Workshops to a county. The JCMH coordinates the mapping with local hosts, invites stakeholders, and facilitates the event. Davis explained how a county can request a mapping through the JCMH website, and presented some of the additional technical assistance the Commission offers, like other trainings and peer mentorship. Finally, Davis spoke about the SIM Mapping Workshop Report, which is prepared by the JCMH afterward and gives the county an action plan that they developed at the workshop. It can also serve as support in any grant applications.
