IDD According to Texas



- IDD = Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities
- Three categories of IDD in Texas
 - 1. Intellectual Disability (IQ 69 or below prior to age 18)
 - 2. Autism Spectrum Disorder
 - 3. Related Condition
- A diagnoses in any one of these categories qualifies a Texan for IDD services through their LIDDA





Intellectual Disability & Mental Illness

Intellectual Disability **#** Mental Illness

- Intellectual disability and mental illness <u>are NOT</u> the same condition, although they can occur in the same person.
- Unlike mental illness, an intellectual disability is
 - always associated with limited intellectual capacity,
 - occurs before age 18, and
 - a permanent condition.
- Mental illness is not associated with a particular level of intelligence, it may occur in a person at any age, and it is often temporary and treatable.
- Individuals with IDD develop a co-occurring mental illness at an incident rate of 30% 40% higher than the general public; yet only 10% receive appropriate mental healthcare.

Medicaid Waivers for Minors Only



- Medically Dependent Children Program (MDCP): provides services to children and adults who are 20 and younger who are medically fragile as an alternative to receiving services in a nursing facility.
- Youth Empowerment Services (YES): provides home and community-based services to children under the age of 19 who otherwise would need psychiatric inpatient care or whose parents would turn to state custody for care.

* Individual must meet eligibility requirements as determined by the State.





Additional Medicaid Waivers for Adults Only



• STAR+PLUS Home and Community-Based Services (HCBS STAR+PLUS): provides services to adults over the age of 21 to keep them in their community as an alternate to being in a nursing facility.



* Individual must meet eligibility requirements as determined by the State.





Medicaid Waivers for People of All Ages



- Community Living and Support Services (CLASS): provides home- and community-based services to people with related conditions as a cost-effective alternative to placement in an intermediate care facility for individuals with an intellectual disability or a related condition.
- Deaf/Blind/Multiple Disabilities Waiver (DBMD): provides children and adults who are deafblind with multiple disabilities services as a cost-effective alternative to institutional placement. The program focuses on increasing opportunities for consumers to communicate and interact with their environment.
- Home and Community-based Services (HCS): provides services to children and adults with an intellectual disability (ID) or a related condition who are living with their family, in their own home or in other community settings, such as small group homes.
- Texas Home Living (TxHmL): provides services to children and adults with an intellectual disability (ID) or a related condition who live in their own home or their family's home.

Community Intermediate Care Facility (ICF) Group Homes

General Information

- 24-hour residential services
- 6-8 residents with IDD in a home
- Case management is provided by the ICF Provider
- No IQ limit if combined with an IDD diagnosis and moderate to extreme deficits in adaptive behavior
- No wait or interest list

Services Provided

- Primary and specialty medical care
- Nursing services
- Dental services
- Specialized therapies (OT, PT, ST)
- Behavioral treatment
- Day habilitation
- Skills training
- Vocational and employment services
- Adaptive aids
- Specialized diets
- Planned activities such as shopping, dining out, going to movies and other recreational and leisure activities in their local communities





Harris County IDD Jail Data 2011-2024



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Based on data matching JIMS jail booking records with The Harris Center's IDD treatment records over the last 14 years (2011-2024), Harris County jail has averaged 526 bookings per year to people with IDD treatment histories (361 unduplicated individuals per year). Data indicates a significant number could potentially be eligible for deflection/diversion.


Early Identification



Implementation of a screening tool to identify those who may have an IDD diagnosis

Positive screen triggers a referral to IDD Eligibility to complete a Determination of Intellectual Disability (DID) Evaluation (or find any existing DID from another LIDDA)

Screening tool developed by The Harris Center's IDD division to be used by a layperson



Judge Ed Emmett Mental Health Diversion Center

- This voluntary program serves as a one-stop shop for law enforcement to divert (from jail) persons with mental illness who have been picked up for low-level, non-violent offenses, like trespassing
- The service array includes:
 - Triage, assessment, 24-48 hour observation, and short-term crisis respite beds.
 - Peer engagement and psychosocial-rehabilitation.
 - Integrated care and individual treatment plans to assist with stabilization.
 - Comprehensive discharge planning and post-release case management
 - Post-discharge access to wraparound services, such as substance abuse treatment and housing, developed through partnerships.
- Aftercare, Post-Release Services:
 - Intensive Community Based Case Management
 - Psychiatry and medication management
 - Psychosocial programming
 - Respite beds
 - Crisis Housing Supports and Permanent Supportive Housing
 - Detox/Residential Substance Use Disorder Services
 - Peer support





Tarrant County Mental Health Jail Diversion Center

The goal is to provide an alternative to arrest for law enforcement who encounter citizens engaging in illegal behavior resulting from or related to mental health crisis

How Does It Work?

- An officer encounters a person suspected of a non-violent criminal trespass, who appears to be having a mental health episode.
- The officer may choose to take the person to the Tarrant County Diversion Center instead of jail.
- No charges will be filed, and the person will not be required to stay. Officers will not have booking responsibilities and will be able to quickly return to patrol.
- Those who choose to stay may remain and receive treatment for immediate needs by MHMR staff.
- Diversion Center staff will work to provide those departing the facility with contacts, resources and aftercare ideally a "warm handoff" to a clinic and follow-up care for up to one year in the community.

 - IEP/504
 - Consult with your LIDDA and/or Transition
 Support Team
