The Problems That Need to Be Solved:




Complicated laws that require coordination

A Lack of Coordination and Knowledge that leads to the system itself serving as a barrier to appropriate treatment and diversion.

Greater numbers of people deteriorating in jail when diversion was possible.

Frustration and blame between stakeholders.








How did the Counties Assess their Proficiency in Mental Health Law?

County MH Law Proficiency Self-Assessment





Reasons for Applying for the Pilot Program


To examine our current processes, work to improve them, expand services, and develop a Mental Health Court.





Prevent Suicide and Improve Crisis Intervention






- Suicides have increased, and there is opportunity for change.
- We want to train law enforcement officers in crisis intervention to improve and streamline processes since the current the process because currently it can take 12 hours and leave areas of the county without law enforcement officers.

To Continue the Work of SIM Mapping



- We want to expand on the work of the SIM Mapping. Not all facets of a functional mental health system were incorporated into the current system, and there is not a complete understanding of mental health laws.
- We hope to see more diversion efforts, streamlined processes, a decrease in local emergency hospitalizations, a decrease in incarceration & detentions, and overall cost savings to the community.



Top Ten Lessons Learned from the JCMH Texas County Mental Health Law Plan



Find Judicial Leaders and Champions: Judicial leadership is key. Find your people--passionate leaders and changemakers who care about people with mental illness, SUD, or IDD.

Collaborate: Inter-disciplinary work groups are necessary to solve complex problems.

Know your Resources: Study your SIM Mapping Report, lists of resources, JCMH Innovations Map.

Look for Gaps and Opportunities to Implement the Mental Health Laws: Complete the JCMH County Mental Health Law Plan Checklist for Self-Analysis

Determine who is Accountable: For each Intercept determine who is leading, implementing, and tracking.

Top Ten Lessons Learned from the JCMH Texas County Mental Health Law Plan



Track Data: Quantitative & Qualitative; Storytelling is powerful.

Seek Funding: Apply for grants, seek out philanthropists, start a nonprofit or a hold a fundraiser to support your work.

Show County Leaders the Savings: To dream big and build a diversion center or other resources.

Celebrate your successes: Announce wins on social media, JCMH Innovations Map, or the JCMH Podcast; make the champions local heroes.

Expect More: Raise the bar on the profession, expect our elected officials to care about mental health.


