A **Treatment Court** is a problem-solving court designed to address the root causes of criminal activity by providing a judicially supervised, individually crafted probation with mandated treatment.

Unique Features: Team Approach, Judicial Involvement, Wrap Around Services.

Treatment Courts in Harris County FORWARD.....

• There are **17 Treatment Courts** in Harris County located in the criminal, family and juvenile courthouses.

- Adult Courts include:
 - 4 Drug Courts
 - 2 Veterans Courts
 - 2 Mental Health Courts
 - 4 D.W.I. Courts.

Treatment Courts in Harris County FORWARD.

Juvenile Courts include:

Anti-Human Trafficking Court (CARE Court)
Anti-Gang Court (GRIP Court)
Drug Court (SOAR Court)
Mental Health Court (360° Court)

Family Court has its own Drug Court to assist in family reunification when substance use disorder is present in the family. (Positive Pathways)

- In 2003, the organization was founded by members of **Emerson Unitarian Universalist Church.**
- In 2006, it was incorporated as an independent, tax-exempt nonprofit as **Harris County Drug Court Foundation**
- The organization was led by a volunteer Board of Directors with no staff and no operational budget.





- Created by All Rise (formerly the National Association of Drug Court Professionals)
- Adult Treatment Court Best Practice Standards, 2013
- This is the definitive source of guidance for treatment court practitioners to implement evidence-based best practices.






Recovery capital is the breadth and depth of internal and external resources that can be drawn upon to initiate and sustain recovery from severe substance use disorder.
