8:45 – 9:30am	In the 1970s, thirty-two Texas men with intellectual disabilities were moved from Texas State Supported Living Centers to work in a turkey processing plant in Atalissa, Iowa. Lacking basic freedoms and foundational supports, the men were housed together in a converted schoolhouse and worked in abusive, neglectful conditions for more than 30 years. Robert Canino, who prosecuted the case of EEOC v. Hill Country Farms, Inc., dba Henry's Turkey Services, will discuss how the EEOC used the Americans with Disabilities Act to win compensatory and punitive damages for intentional discrimination of the plaintiffs. The outcome of the case raised national awareness of similar situations across the country and illuminates the vital role in protecting and monitoring the well-being of vulnerable populations.
